

BE READY BEFORE YOU VOTE

MAKE YOUR VOTING PLAN

- Confirm your registration, name, and address.
- Find your correct polling place and hours.
- Check your state's voter ID rules.
- Review a sample ballot and research candidates and measures.
- Choose how you will vote: early, by mail/absentee, or on Election Day.
- If voting by mail, check signature, witness, postage, and return deadlines.

Deadlines and rules vary by state - and can change. Verify them before every election.

BRING WHAT YOU NEED

- Accepted identification, if your state requires it
- Your sample ballot or notes
- Any required assistance or accessibility information
- **Patience** - lines may be longer at peak times

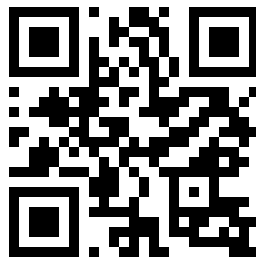

CHECK & REGISTER

CHECK YOUR REGISTRATION STATUS

Go to VOTE411.org, select your state, and follow the link to your official voter lookup. Confirm:

- Your legal name and current residential address
- Your registration is active
- Your party choice, if relevant to a primary
- Your polling place or vote center

REGISTER OR UPDATE

Use VOTE411.org or VOTE.gov to reach your state's official instructions. Depending on your state, you may register online, by mail, or in person.

Update your registration after:

- Moving or changing your mailing address
- Changing your legal name
- Changing party affiliation, where applicable

DO IT EARLY!

There is no single national registration deadline. Some states offer same-day registration; others close registration weeks before an election.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

States run elections, so registration deadlines, ID requirements, early voting, mail-ballot rules, and restoration of voting rights after a felony conviction vary.

FEDERAL PROTECTIONS

- Eligible voters **cannot** be denied the vote because of race or color.
- Voting discrimination based on disability is prohibited; polling places and voting systems must provide access and accommodations required by law.
- Federal law protects voters from intimidation, threats, and coercion.
- Certain jurisdictions must provide language assistance and translated election materials.
- **If your eligibility cannot be confirmed at the polls in a federal election, you generally have the right to cast a provisional ballot.** Whether it counts depends on eligibility and state rules.
- If you are in line when the polls close, stay in line and ask to vote.
- **Armed federal agents are PROHIBITED from being stationed at polling places to police elections, question voters, intimidate communities, or interfere with voting.**
- Federal law strictly limits armed federal presence at election sites and **prohibits voter intimidation by anyone—including government officials.**

ELIGIBILITY BASICS

You generally must be a U.S. citizen, meet your state's residency rules, be old enough by Election Day under state law, and satisfy any state-specific eligibility requirements.

Never rely on a social-media post for voting rules. Confirm at VOTE411.org or with your election office.

WHEN YOU VOTE

AT THE POLLING PLACE

- Go to the location **assigned to you** unless your jurisdiction uses voting centers.
- Ask a poll worker for help if you need instructions, accessibility support, or language assistance.
- If your name is missing, ask workers to check spelling, address, and the correct precinct. **Then ask about same-day registration or a provisional ballot.**
- If someone challenges, threatens, or obstructs you, remain calm and document details when safe.
